3. To rescind and replace the extant Resolution as set out in Appendix 2B of the 2026 Report on Extant States' Resolutions.

1 Executive Summary

- 1.1 The Policy & Resources Committee (“the Committee”) is mandated to monitor the implementation of extant States’ Resolutions and submit to the States annually a report on progress¹.
- 1.2 By way of summary, the table below sets out the total number of extant States’ Resolutions as at March 2026.

- 1.3 These Resolutions are laid out in full in Appendices 1A to 1L. Appendix 2A sets out Resolutions it is proposed to rescind. These have been put forward by Committees on the basis that they have been superseded or are no longer considered relevant given a change in policy or context. In one instance, the Committee has identified a need to rescind and replace a Resolution (Appendix 2B).
- 1.4 The Policy & Resources Committee has explored ways to strengthen how progress on existing Resolutions is monitored and reported, with the aim of

providing the States and the public with more timely and detailed updates. A refined internal process has now been adopted to streamline this work. This remains an ongoing initiative, and the Committee anticipates that it will deliver tangible improvements within the current political term.

2 Introduction

- 2.1 This Policy Letter is brought to the States' Assembly to discharge the Committee's mandated responsibility to monitor the implementation of extant States' Resolutions and to submit an annual report listing progress on those outstanding, as outlined in the Rules of Procedure of the States of Deliberation and their Committees.²
- 2.2 The purpose of this reporting is to highlight the decisions of government yet to be implemented in order that the States can hold their Committees to account. This ensures greater accountability and public visibility of the ongoing work of government.
- 2.3 In previous years this information has been included alongside monitoring reports on the Government Work Plan ("GWP") and more recently in a separate Policy Letter debated in February 2025³ which provided an opportunity for deeper scrutiny at the end of the 2020-2025 political term.
- 2.4 This update was not included in the 2026-2029 Government Work Plan ("GWP")⁴ Policy Letter debated in January this year. In light of the general election in 2025 and the significant change in membership in States' Committees, the Policy & Resources Committee had considered it appropriate to afford time for Committees to immerse themselves in mandates and ongoing business before annual reporting. As the Assembly has supported the need to streamline the GWP processes, the next annual Resolution update will be published independent of that reporting.
- 2.5 Resolutions from previous States' Assemblies are sometimes deprioritised by successor Committees or can suffer from the lack of sufficient resource to progress them most especially when resulting from Amendments led from outside the accountable committees. The consequence as clearly illustrated in the Appendices below is that some Resolutions have remained a States' commitment for many years with seemingly little progress. The Policy Letter presents a snapshot to the States and the opportunity through debate or secondary proposition to offer guidance on priorities for their committees.

3 Extant States' Resolutions as of the beginning of May 2026

- 3.1 As outlined in the introduction, this Policy Letter provides a list of extant States' Resolutions that remain outstanding (Appendices 1A-1L), separated by the Committee responsible for discharging them.
- 3.2 Appendix 2 identifies Resolutions that are proposed for rescission by accountable Committees. In these circumstances those Committees have also provided explanatory narrative to support their proposal to rescind a Resolution.
- 3.3 Some Resolutions direct the preparation of legislation included in the Prioritisation of Legislative Drafting Schedule, which is a separate process also requiring annual reporting and therefore has a dedicated Policy Letter. Those Resolutions have been included in this Policy Letter in order that the total volume of outstanding government work can be better understood.
- 3.4 Following the States' consideration of the 2026-2029 GWP, appropriate Resolutions have been listed against the 'area of focus' they engage and whether they align with one of the five 'super priorities'.
- 3.5 The following table analyses the outstanding Resolutions by Committee mandate.

4 Reporting on States’ Resolutions

- 4.1 All Resolutions made by the States are recorded on parliament.gg. Some are discharged as soon as they are made by the Assembly, for example those that are to: note a report; appoint to a Committee; approve legislation; and progress procedural matters.
- 4.2 Resolutions also direct operational action or instruct a policy direction. This generates future work and the Resolutions are viewed as outstanding/extant until that work is reported as completed by the engaged Committee/s. It is these Outstanding Resolutions the Committee is mandated to bring to the Assembly annually – including any proposed for rescission.
- 4.3 Since 2016, the Assembly has agreed more than 4,500 Resolutions – excluding those that are procedural. Over 1,200 directed action, almost 400 Resolutions were appointments or elections, and over 1,000 were the approval of funding or legislation.
- 4.4 In previous years, the Committee has looked at ways of improving the

monitoring and reporting on progress against extant Resolutions so that more timely and detailed updates can be provided to the States and the public. An improved approach has been adopted internally to streamline the process and improve accountability. This is an ongoing effort which the Committee hopes will have tangible results in this political term.

5 Proposed Rescission of States' Resolutions

- 5.1 The Committee has liaised with all States' Committees to confirm Resolutions remain relevant and appropriate. The process of rescinding Resolutions which are no longer appropriate in the view of the Committee responsible to advise the States, ensures good governance in the effective management of government business.
- 5.2 Where Resolutions have been superseded or are no longer considered relevant given a change in policy or context, the Committees with engaged mandates have advised that they should be considered for rescission (Appendix 2A). Where this is the case, an explanatory note has been provided.
- 5.3 Committees have also identified opportunities to revise (rescind and replace) Resolutions (Appendix 2B). Where this is the case, an explanatory note has been provided.

6 Use of Rule 25 in debate

- 6.1 The Committee intends to seek the Assembly's support to engage Rule 25⁶ of the Rules of Procedure of the States of Deliberation and their Committees. This permits the States to sit "in committee", which would provide for any States Member to be called to speak more than once in the same debate as necessary.
- 6.2 This will afford the opportunity for representatives of lead committees to speak to their respective extant Resolutions and respond to questions about their status and progress. Engaging Rule 25 will therefore provide for the most informative and constructive debate.
- 6.3 The Presiding Officer has had advanced notice of the Committee's intention.

7 Compliance with Rule 4

⁶ Rule 25 (1): Before a debate commences or during the debate, the Presiding Officer or any Member may propose a motion that the States sit "in committee" on the grounds that the matter being debated would be better considered subject to the specific provisions of this Rule.

7.1 Rule 4 of the Rules of Procedure of the States of Deliberation and their Committees sets out the information which must be included in, or appended to, motions laid before the States.

7.2 In accordance with Rule 4(1):

- a) The propositions contribute to the States' objectives and policy plans by assessing the status of outstanding Resolutions and considering whether they are still appropriate against the States' strategic priorities as agreed through the Government Work Plan.
- b) In preparing the propositions, consultation has been undertaken with all States Committees with outstanding Resolutions.
- c) The propositions have been submitted to His Majesty's Procureur for advice on any legal or constitutional implications.
- a) There are no direct financial implications to the States of carrying the proposal into effect, other than the more effective use of resources through the rescission of Resolutions.

7.3 In accordance with Rule 4(2):

- a) The propositions relate to the Committee's mandate regarding the leadership and co-ordination of government policy planning and overseeing the policy planning cycle; requiring, and monitoring, the implementation of extant States' Resolutions.
- b) The propositions have the unanimous support of the Committee.

There are mechanisms in place for inter-country adoption to take place locally by going through the United Kingdom and it is therefore suggested that it would be a disproportionate use of resources to set up the relevant authorities locally in order to have the Convention extended. Secondly, work to amend and update the Adoption (Guernsey) Law, 1970 is unable to progress until this specific Convention has either been extended, or the resolution rescinded, due to the stipulation in the 2016 Policy Letter the Secondary Regulations must be drafted alongside the Primary Law, which the Inter-Country Adoption Convention impacts. Suggested to replace Resolution with: "1. That the Policy & Resources Committee should request His Majesty's Government to seek the extension, in respect of Guernsey, of the Government's ratification of the provisions of: (b) the Hague Convention on the Civil Aspects of Child Abduction (1980), and the European Convention on Recognition and Enforcement of Decisions Concerning Custody of Children and on Restoration of Custody of Children (1980), once all necessary domestic legislation is in place."
